EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

Employee Milestone

Chris McKay celebrated his 30th anniversary with the Town of Farmville on June 15. We are deeply grateful for his dedication, experience, and continued contributions to the Communications Center.

Radio System Update

Crystal Barton, Ethan Whaley, Trey Pyle, and David Wilmoth traveled to Chicago to review the new radio system. While there, they met with Motorola to ensure the system meets the required standards and reviewed a checklist outlining its capabilities. While this system will be an adjustment, we're excited to be part of this major improvement for all first responders in the county.

Supervisor Training

Melanie Kincheloe and Cody Hudgins attended a NENA Supervisor Course at the Criminal Justice Academy in Lynchburg. The course provided valuable resources and tools for supervising staff, writing daily reports, and effectively managing the Communications Center.

Commendations

Two employees received Letters of Commendation for their outstanding response to separate suicidal caller incidents this month:

- Timothy Seamster stayed on the line for over 15 minutes, offering support until deputies arrived on scene.
- Brittany Atkinson, who had only been back on shift for three days, provided calm and compassionate support to another suicidal caller until officers arrived.

Their actions made a real difference, and both letters have been placed in their personnel files with Human Resources. To build on this, all staff completed five online training courses focused on handling mental health crisis calls. These reinforce our Total Response Procedures and emphasize the importance of trust, empathy, and communication with those in distress.

June 29th Incident

On Sunday, June 29, Sgt. Thompson came across a homicide suspect on Route 460 and reported “shots fired” over the radio, something a Communications Operator never wants to hear.

The Communications Center team responded immediately. They sent help, notified citizens and command staff, and handled everything needed to support responders in the field. This was all done while continuing to answer 911 calls and respond to public questions.

On duty that day were Melanie Kincheloe, Mike Driskill, and Megan Wright. Ethan Whaley, who had just completed his shift, returned to assist until Chris McKay arrived. The team’s quick action, professionalism, and teamwork made a major difference. We are proud of how they handled this serious situation and thankful for the positive outcome.

Staffing Update

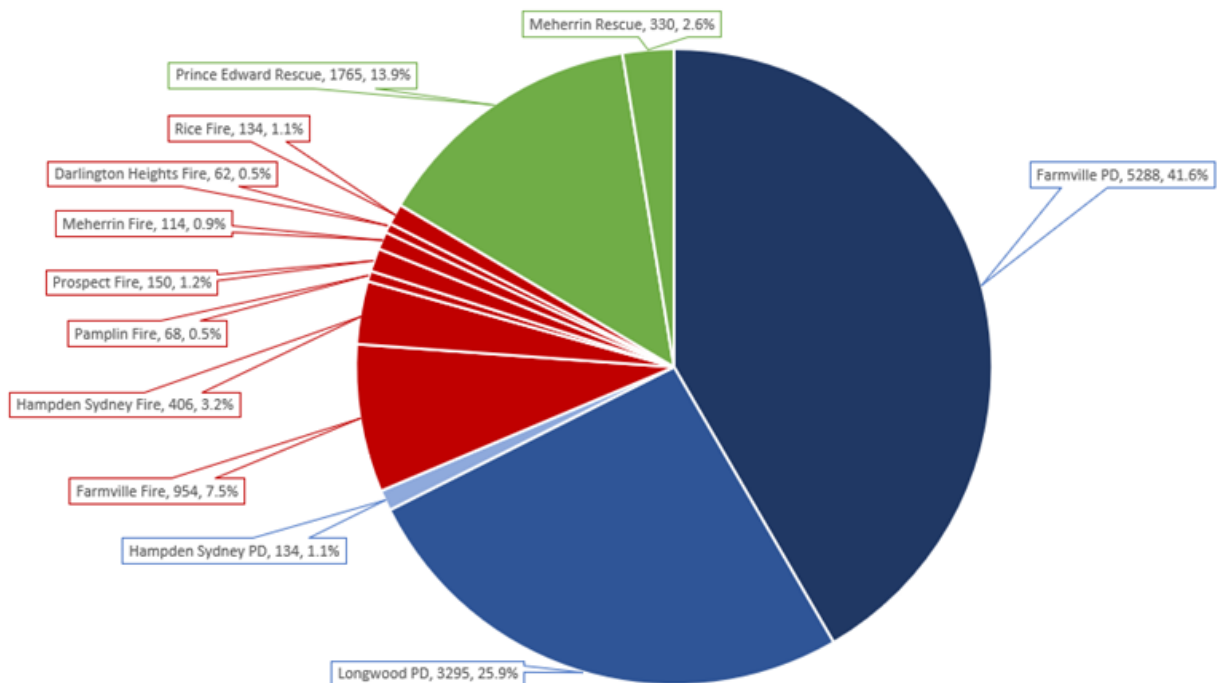
We’re excited to share that the Communications Center is now fully staffed.

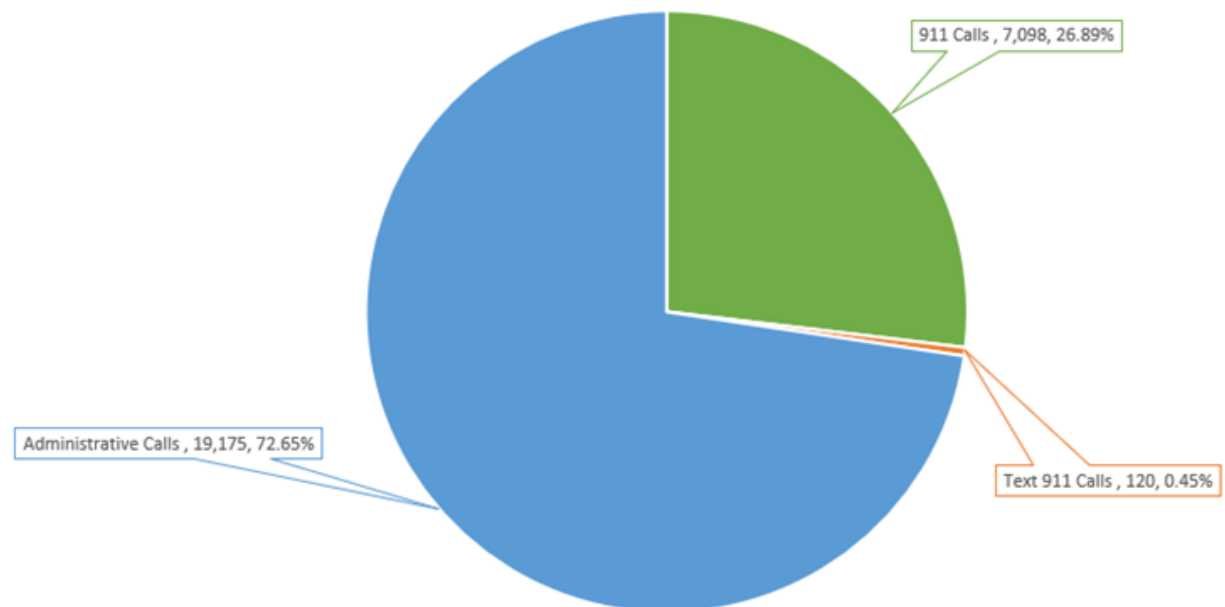

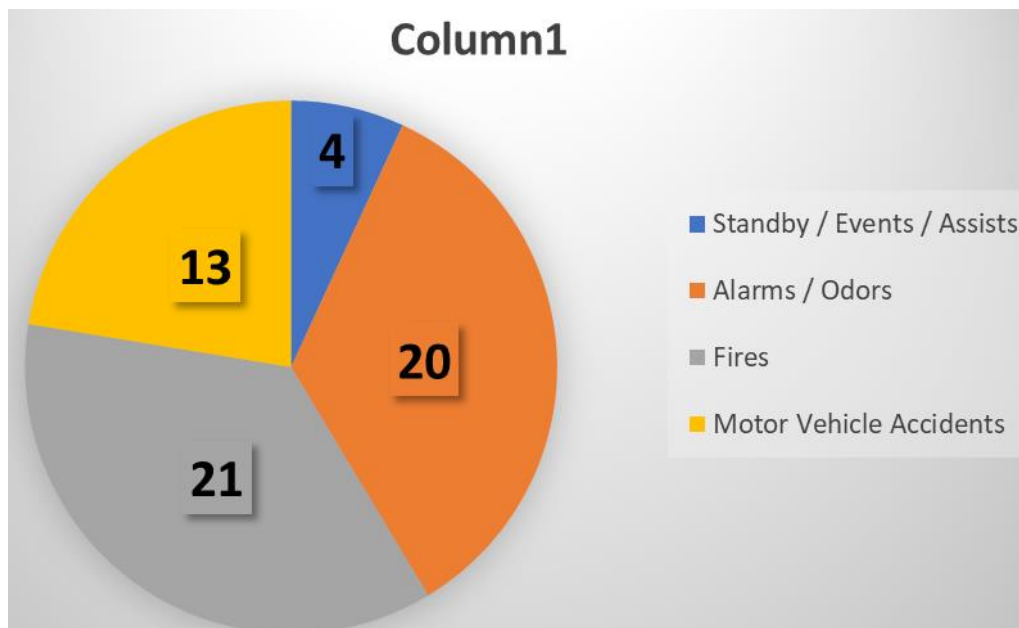
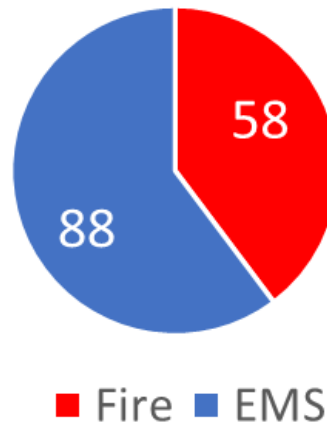
