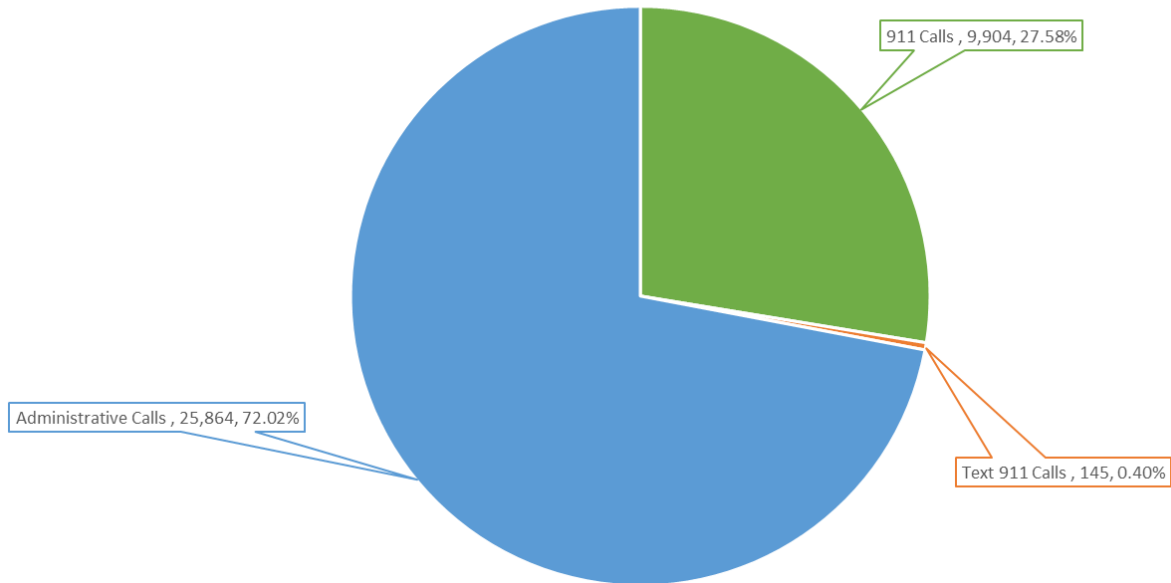

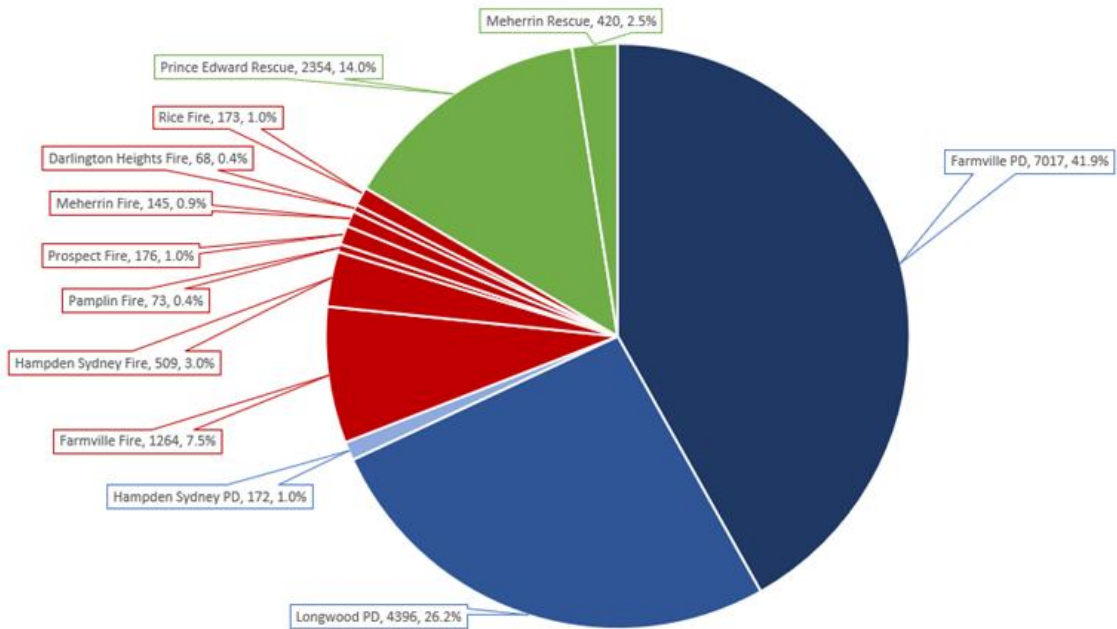

(Farmville Fire and Hampden Sydney Fire also include Calls For Service for EMS First Responder Programs)



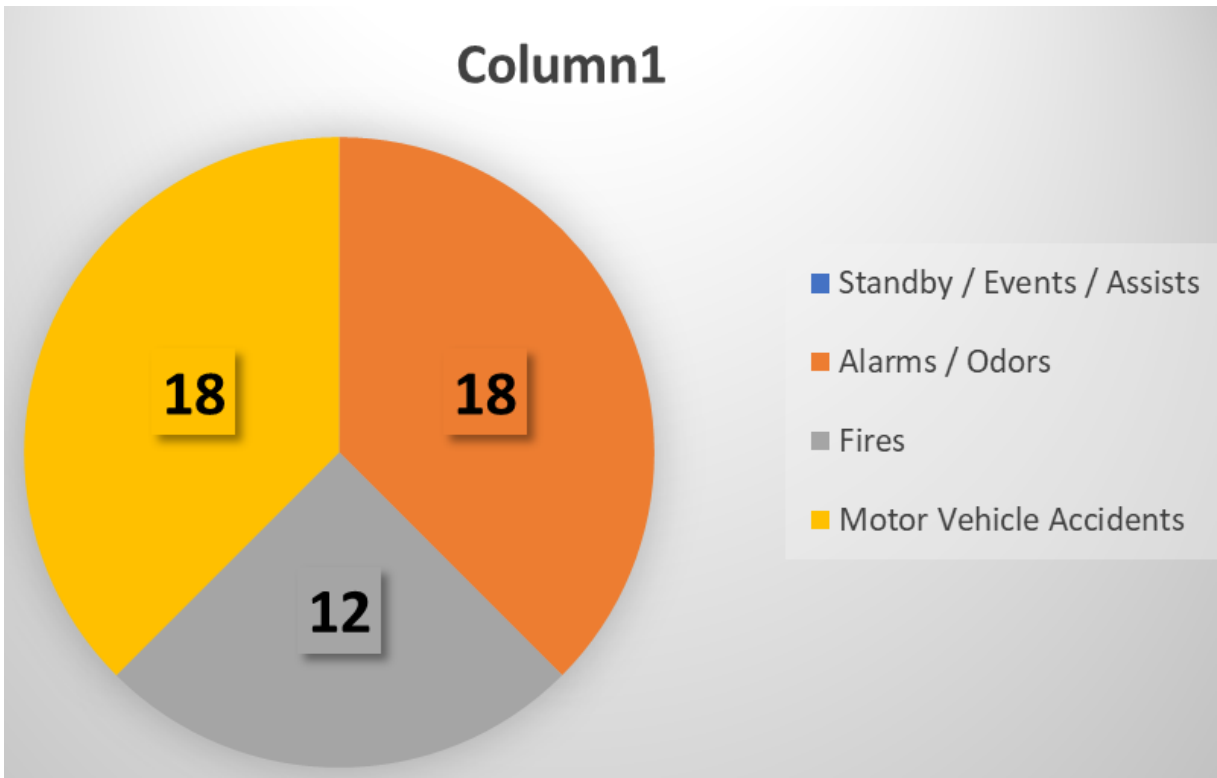
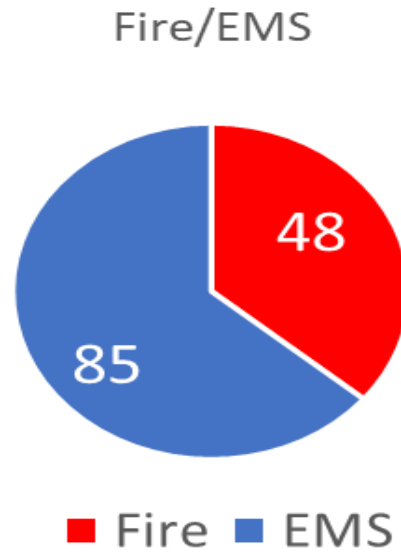

VII. RECREATION DEPARTMENT

EVENTS

- The Heart of Virginia 5k/10k will take place on September 13th. The registration is available on the Heart of Virginia Website. Currently, at 25 registrants as of 8/5/25, and we had 99 participants last year.
- The Jingle Bell Race will take place on December 13th, 2025, and registration is open as of July 1st. Current registrants are 2 at the moment, and we had 66 participants last year.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- The Parks and Recreation Department was trained in First Aid/AED training on May 13th, 2025. This is precautionary due to the variety of programs and the people attending those events.
- In addition, we are looking to add Mental Health First Aid Training and Certified Parks and Recreation Professional (CPRP) with the National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA) within the coming year to cover upcoming programs and events.

- Krystle Watkins was promoted to Full-Time Recreation Specialist in May after Jeff Kinne resigned from the Parks and Recreation Department.
- Charlie Gallagher filled our part-time Recreation Technician position, and she will cover the responsibilities for Recreation Sports and other program activities, such as pickleball.

PROGRAMMING

- Adult Softball League concluded on June 25th, and we had 4 teams participate this year. The league was on hiatus for the past few years due to participant behavior. The feedback from the teams was positive, and we look forward to an increase in participation next year. The maximum number of teams for the Softball league is 12.
- Football and Cheerleading registrations closed on August 15th at 5 pm. The first day of practice was on July 28th. We have 58 youth football players and 30 cheerleaders for a total of 88 participants. We also have 16 football coaches, 7 cheer coaches, and 8 additional volunteers for a total of 31 volunteers.
